In labor, Kali awakens to the demands of worship, jagaana is an excerpt from dhoka/Betraval/: God Unspoken. dhoka entangles Hindu goddess Kali's ultimate power with authoritarianism and religious violence, examining Hinduism's colonization into propaganda for violence against dark-skinned bodies and Muslims. In solidarity with Palestinian, Muslim, and Arab communities. Their worlds unpack systems and symptoms of power from a queer, punk solidarity-based lens that rehearses freedom in body and mind.
