

Founded in 1986, Dixon Place (DP) is a non-profit institution deeply committed to fostering visionary artists by developing and presenting original work in the performing and literary arts. Organically developed programs, policies and curatorial practices ensure inclusivity regarding gender, race, sexual orientation, disabilities, age, and ethnicity. In a professional, compassionate, safe environment where artist remuneration is a priority, this local bastion inspires and encourages creators to generate new ideas and implement new practices.

The name "Breath Dance Project" embodies the integral connection between breath, movement, and the process of navigating our emotional landscapes. Our logo symbolizes this connection, emphasizing the grounding impact that nature, breath, and dance all have on the human body.

This piece is an excerpt reflecting selections of movement that are part of a long-term project to create an anthology of LGBTQ+ stories informed by community input discussing queer joy, love, relationships, and pain through movement. These stories focus on emotions, life events, and relationships, with the goal to showcase the diversity of the queer experience.
