

Goddess - Theme: Fight

This evocative dance work channels goddess archetypes in three sections: Gaia's nurturing earthiness, the Sirens' fluid allure, and the Amazons' fierce power. Through grounded breath, hypnotic unison, and tribal strength, a layered identity is explored—mother, enchantress, warrior—embodying the divine feminine's complexity, duality, and force with emotional resonance and physical intensity.
