

Founded in 1986, Dixon Place (DP) is a non-profit institution deeply committed to fostering visionary artists by developing and presenting original work in the performing and literary arts. Organically developed programs, policies and curatorial practices ensure inclusivity regarding gender, race, sexual orientation, disabilities, age, and ethnicity. In a professional, compassionate, safe environment where artist remuneration is a priority, this local bastion inspires and encourages creators to generate new ideas and implement new practices.

Pioneered in our founder's home with programs based on the needs of myriad communities, the organization and venue grew exponentially and in 2009 opened the professional, accessible facility you're sitting in.

Sri Thina Dance

Pieces of Me - Themes: Fight, Freedom

A Collective Portrait of Womanhood fuses Bharatanatyam, Odissi, spoken word, and contemporary movement into a raw monologue-in-motion exploring motherhood, fight, and freedom. Directed by Sri Thina Subramaniam, it confronts the unspoken struggles of women—the exhaustion, rage, and resilience beneath silence—transforming personal battles into collective liberation through embodied storytelling, defiant choreography, and a shared reclaiming of voice and visibility.

Sri Thina Subramaniam is an internationally acclaimed Bharatanatyam and Odissi dancer, educator, and artistic leader whose work bridges classical traditions with contemporary social themes. As Artistic Director of the Temple of Fine Arts and founder of Kala Collective, she champions cultural education and broadens access to Indian classical arts, particularly among underserved communities. Since moving to the U.S., she has curated major cultural events, presented original works, and collaborated across disciplines. Her performances have graced renowned venues including Lincoln Center, the Royal Opera House, and Buckingham Palace. She is a recipient of the DNJ Mini-Grant (2023), MAP Fund grant (2024), and New Jersey Individual Artist Fellowship (2025).
